

A <u>root</u> is a word part that has a specific meaning. There are 3 kinds of roots:

prefix base suffix

A <u>prefix</u> is added to the front of a base.

A <u>base</u> is the main part of a word.

A <u>suffix</u> is added to the end of a base.


